Your child will be assessed on the following skills during the first week of kindergarten.

Math


- number recognition 0-20
- rote count forward to 30 or beyond
- shape recognition---circle, square, rectangle, triangle
- recites address
- recites phone number

Language Arts

- upper case letter recognition
 - lower case letter recognition
 - practice “First Quarter” sight words (attached)
 - recites first and last name
 - writes first and last name
(Use the attached handwriting sheet as a guide for letter formation.)
 - recites birthday (month and day)

Activities for Math Expectations


- Flash number cards (0-20) out of order and have your child identify the number.
 - Go on a scavenger hunt and have your child find the various shapes (square, rectangle, triangle, circle)
 - Have your child be a detective and search for numbers on toys, in ads, on cereal boxes, etc.
 - Form numbers and shapes with playdough, yarn, pipe cleaners, beans, dot markers, etc.
 - Write numbers in the sand, on a chalk board or whiteboard, on a Magna Doodle.
 - Play number and shape recognition games: Number Bingo, Shape Bingo.
 - Count how many steps to the bedroom, to the mailbox, to the car, etc.
 - Count how many times you can bounce a ball.

Activities for Language Arts Expectations

- Flash lowercase letters out of order and have your child identify the letters.
 - Flash the capital letters out of order and have your child identify the letters.
 - Identify letters in the environment.
(letters on a menu, on signs, on cereal boxes, in newspapers, in books, etc.)
 - Form letters with yarn, playdough, clay, beans, etc.
 - Write letters in the sand.
 - Write letters with chalk on a brown paper bag.
 - Look at the sight word sheet and identify the letters in the words.
 - Write your name with a pencil, a crayon, a marker.
 - Parents, READ, READ, READ to your child.



KINDERGARTEN

FYI

- Kindergarteners bring white tote bags to school. **NO BOOK BAGS.** Help your child decorate his or her tote bag. Keep in mind that the bag will need to go into the laundry basket from time to time.
 - Kindergarteners are expected to use the bathroom independently. They are also expected to button and zip their clothing independently. (We suggest getting a uniform belt early and start breaking it in.) We do follow all uniform policies and will be checking for uniform pants, socks, shoes, sweatshirts, etc.
 - Kindergarteners open and close lunchboxes, food containers, and juice boxes independently.
 - Kindergarteners are expected to always practice table manners. (Eat with mouth closed. Don't talk when you are eating. Sit at the table. Don't play with your food.)
 - Kindergarteners crave routine! Create a routine for homework time, meal time, bath time, and bed time.
 - Label all school items with your child's name in permanent marker. It is not necessary to label individual supplies such as crayons, pencils, or glue sticks.
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Take time to read some of these books to your child. Research has shown that the single greatest factor in predicting reading success is whether a child is read to when young. Here are some titles to get you started.
